

Letter from Bishop Sean about Diocesan Staff

Friday, October 17, 2012





I am grateful to everyone who made last weekend's diocesan convention such a spirited success. Your enthusiasm is a blessing to our church and a great gift to me as your bishop. As I said in my sermon at the convention Eucharist, we have some difficult work ahead of us if we are to become a more spiritually vital, financially sustainable diocese that manifests God's love in word and deed, but together we have made an excellent start.

Part of that difficult work is to reduce the size of the diocesan staff so that more of the money contributed by the people of the diocese can be devoted to mission and ministry on the local level. In these quickly changing times, adaptability is essential, and we can no longer maintain the large staff we now have. Today, then, I am eliminating four staff positions and, regretfully, ending the employment of four full-time staff members who have given faithful service to our diocese.

Departing staff members whose positions are being eliminated include Rosie Hummel, administrative assistant for programs and database; Kat Lehman, director of communication and information technology; and the Rev. Andrew Reinholz, staff liaison for congregational renewal. As you may know, Ellyn Siftar has resigned as youth and young adult minister and will finish her work with us in mid-November. Ellyn is returning to college, and that position will also be eliminated after she departs.

In addition, we are no longer able to afford the costs associated with the full-time position of archdeacon. The Venerable Howard Stringfellow will end his service in that job at the end of the month. Howard has helped to lead this diocese for the past nine years, and I am grateful to him for his faithful service, his liturgical wisdom and his support of the episcopate.

When I spoke at our convention about the need to make staff cuts, I promised to work extra hard to treat people with dignity and respect. Departing staff members will receive a generous severance that includes career counseling and job placement services or diocesan assistance in seeking a new position in the church. I want to emphasize that each of our departing staff members made important contributions to the life of the diocese, and I am eager for them to find new and fulfilling employment. Please keep them in your prayers.

Reducing the size of the diocesan staff and the budget required to support diocesan operations is the first step—but only the first step—in creating the vital congregations we all want. I will be in touch in the coming weeks to tell you more about our new and evolving staff structure and help make sure you can direct the concerns you once shared with these former staff members to the proper person. If you have questions in the meantime, please call the diocesan office at 610 691 5655.

Once again, please join me in thanking our departing employees for their service, and remember to keep them in your prayers.

Delegates Report of the 143rd Convention Of the Diocese of Bethlehem

Despite the grey and rainy day outside, the 143rd Convention of the Diocese of Bethlehem began on Friday, October 10th in an upbeat mood. Our Provisional Bishop, The Right Reverend Sean Rowe, gave the main address talking about how the collaboration between our diocese and the Diocese of Northwest PA is an historic event. Having one bishop overseeing two dioceses has never happened before in the Episcopal Church. Representatives on the Standing Committee from the Diocese of Northwest PA attended our convention and representatives of our Standing Committee will be attending their convention on November 7th and 8th.

Bishop Sean addressed our diocesan budget and its constraints. He said we would move toward paying our full apportionment to the National Church. We have been paying about 4% and we are asked to pay 19%. He also indicated that there would cuts to the diocesan staff. More information on that will be forthcoming.

The latest information on the diocesan audits is that they have been completed for 2007 and 2008. 2009 and 2010 are almost complete and 2011, 2012, and 2013 will be completed as soon as possible.

Three of the four resolutions presented at the Convention were passed. The first resolution was on our diocesan budget, calling for us to pay both the assessment of 12% and the acceptance of 3%, which are the same rates as last year. This resolution passed.

The second resolution passed was on the 2015 salary schedule. This resolution calls for a cost of living increase of 3% for lay employees and clergy. Last year was a 0% increase.

The third was a resolution to established more comprehensive requirements for purchase, possession, and carrying of firearms. This resolution, after much discussion, was tabled.

The fourth resolution calling for limiting firearm and ammunition capacities was passes after some discussion.

Elections of various offices were held. Kurt Kovalovich was elected to the Diocesan Council which is charged with budgeting and program and Father Jim was reelected to the Diocesan Board of Trustees.


At the Convention Eucharist Bishop Sean preached about the need to develop new levels of trust and transparency. In his sermon he said that we don't know where God is leading us. We need to look forward and not back.

On Saturday morning everyone at the convention participated in small groups to identify where we see the diocese as we move forward. As part of the overall process Al Johnson, who was hired to help facilitate the 'listening' component, was present to lead us in this discussion. He has already interviewed the diocesan staff, the Standing Committee and a sampling of other clergy and lay people. There are further opportunities in the 'listening' process for all of us to voice our opinions and concerns. See the bulletin as to time and places.


The Children's Service will be held on Christmas Eve at 5 p.m.

Twelve Days of Christmas in Kajo Keji Breaking The Cycle

The recent violence on Kajo Keji's border with Uganda reminds us how hard it is to change the habits of generations. We know, however, that, given time and patience, the Hand of God will prevail. Sometimes His hand, however, needs our help. Through the New Hope program and the annual Twelve days of Christmas campaign the Diocese of Bethlehem has already had an impact on many lives. We also know that, after a belief in God and an understanding of His will, education is the surest way to bring a society out of its cycle of violence.



Lacking sufficient government support, the schools that have been built through New Hope must charge their students a tuition. While this tuition may represent a trivial amount by our standards, it presents a severe, and to some an insurmountable, obstacle for many families in Kajo Keji.

The children of Kajo Keji will be the future leaders of the new Republic of South Sudan. By helping to provide them with an education based on Christ's teachings we can help to break the vicious cycle of violence.

NEWS FROM MARION C. PRICE TRUST FUND

I devise my residence at 2208 Mahantongo St, Pottsville, PA and my real property adjoining the dwelling to the Trinity Episcopal Church of Pottsville, PA, to be used for the purpose of maintaining, purchasing, constructing and or renovating a facility in Schuylkill County to be used as a home for elder members of the Episcopal faith residing in Schuylkill County, PA.

These were words of the late Marion C. Price in her last will and testament. This past December was the 35th anniversary of her death.

She was a very devoted member of Trinity, and donated generously over the years. Even in her death gifting the majority of her estate to Trinity.

In 1980 the Trinity Episcopal Church created the Marion C. Price Fund Council.

In 1986 the focus was changed so the funds could be used to help elderly Episcopalians live as independently as possible either in their homes or assisted living facilities. The Rector of Trinity is to serve as President and the Council will include three lay members of Trinity and one lay member from each Episcopal Parish in Schuylkill County, as it remains to this day.

In 1987 the trust was valued at slightly over one million dollars. \$542,000 in the principal account and \$536,000 in the income portfolio. Even though over the years the principal account has grown it is basically untouchable due to the trust agreement set up so many years ago. And the income account (which is our operating account) has been reduced dramatically due to the poor financial market in recent years.

Since its inception the Marion Price Trust Fund has allocated approximately ½ million dollars in grants for hearing aids to personal care, eyeglasses to chair glides, prescriptions to roof repairs. All measures to improve the quality of life of elderly Episcopalians.

I am required to give monthly reports: number of telephone calls, home visits, hospital visits, etc. But inspired by something Father Jim Rinehart said in one of his sermons I started including a report entitled "more than just numbers". These are the real picture of how the MPTF has impacted individuals.

After 18 years as your Parish Nurse I hope that Marion Price would be happy to hear that her vision has evolved but continues to maintain the dignity of elderly Episcopalians as they face different life crises. Here is just a sample:

- taking a parishioner to his doctor and then the emergency room because his family lives in New Jersey
- taking a slice of pizza once a month to have lunch with a woman who recently lost her husband
- taking a parishioner to see her dying friend

- getting medic alert information for people living alone so if they fall they won't have to lay there for hours until help finally arrives
- helping a parishioner with poor eyesight do her pacemaker check
- sitting with a parishioner when her friend of 30 years is being buried
- sitting with a parishioner while she meets with funeral director to prepay for and arrange her own funeral
- completing a pace or rent rebate application then getting a call from a delighted parishioner that saved \$80 on a prescription because the pace application we just submitted for him was accepted
- loading a woman with abdominal pain into my car and getting her to the ER, or
- helping a lady apply for and get settled into a hi rise when she suddenly found herself needing to find an apartment

While the MPTF is currently facing a financial crisis, serving our elderly remains our prime focus as we look to review and refine avenues to continue this vital ministry to the elderly Episcopalians of Schuylkill County.

Operation We Care next mailing will be held in November. If you know of any local serviceman or women stationed in Iraq or Afghanistan please notify Kathy Burda so we can include them in our next mailing.

Medicare open enrollment has begun. Fall open enrollment started October 15th and continues until December 7th. In most cases, fall open enrollment is the only time you can pick a new Medicare Advantage or Medicare Part D plan. Even if you are satisfied with your Medicare Advantage or Medicare Part D plan, you should check to see if there is another plan in your area that will offer you better health and/or drug coverage at a more affordable price. Research shows that people with Medicare prescription drug coverage (Part D) could lower their costs by shopping among plans each year. For example, another Part D plan may cover the drugs you take with fewer prescriptions and charge you less.

THANKFULNESS

Fall is upon us and Thanksgiving is fast approaching. The Charles Baber garden cemetery is absolutely spectacular at this time of year. The white ash started the show changing to yellow leaves which quickly dropped. This was followed by the sugar maples in splashes of orange, rust and yellow. The deep red lollipop flowers of the staghorn sumac became prominent as the green leaves changed to bright red and then dropped. The tuliptree and ginkgos with their tall narrow profiles, followed shortly thereafter with their yellows. The hornbeams on Center St. are green with golden crowns. Behind them on the east wall are burgundy pin oaks and to the west are golden London planetrees with their patchwork bark of yellow and gray. The oaks and black walnuts are dropping their acorns\nuts for the squirrels to store for the winter. Dotted throughout the property are brilliant reds from the 'sunset' red maples. The many assorted Japanese maples wear wine colors of merlot, pinot noir, and cabernet sauvignon. The needles on the eastern white pines and on the cryptomeria have changed from green to brown. No matter what lane or road one takes, the breathtaking beauty of the kaleidoscope of colors dazzles the eyes.

Here at the garden cemetery, the beauty of nature is at its finest. And it is at this time of year, that one is reminded of all the things we can be thankful for. The cemetery is especially thankful for it board members who have to make wise and practical decisions in managing the property while working with a limited budget. It is thankful for all those who have contributed to the Sch. Area Community Foundation endowment account to ensure its future existence. It is grateful to Tom, Bob, and Randy who so caringly mow the grass, vacuum the leaves, shovel the long snow laden sidewalk, and maintain a friendly relationship with all visitors and dog walkers. It is grateful to the tree pruners and the sponsors of the Arbor Day tree replacement program, and to the forestry service and shade tree commission who protect and replace its trees. And it is grateful for its extensive website that showcases its trees, memorial makers, and its history. Thank you to everyone who supports this awesome 20+ acre garden cemetery and to all who are supporting its current \$65,000 renovation project.
