Thankful, Grateful and Blessed

As the Thanksgiving holiday season approaches these words seem to be everywhere. I have seen them in many Fall and Thanksgiving decorations, including on two decorative boards at my home church. The reminders are nestled among two beautiful arrangements of fall flowers, leaves, and pumpkin decorations. I love the fall and its beautiful colorful decorations and this year I feel that I am being reminded to be thankful in more ways than a holiday decoration.

It began a few weeks ago with a video of Joyce Meyer speaking on the power of gratitude. It was a powerful sermon on being grateful and thankful. She was urging us to be thankful at all times, not just when things are going our way. I find that it is easy to give thanks for food – because my cupboards are full: shelter – because I have a home; good health – because I'm healthy; employment – because I love my job; family – because I think mine is pretty great! The harder question is can I give thanks when things are not going my way? Of course, I can....I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.....but do I?

Joyce urges us to have a thankful attitude and stop complaining so much. We need to be thankful when we are having troubles and things are not going our way. Even then, you can always find something to be happy about. Make a list of what you have to be thankful for. In the New Testament Paul encourages us to "give thanks" at least 46 times. Perhaps his most difficult direction is found in 1 Thessalonians 5:18, "In everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you". Paul was imprisoned, persecuted, and beaten, yet he was full of thanksin all circumstances.

In church this past week I read the scripture lesson Philippians 4:6 Do not be anxious about anything, but by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. This is one of my favorite verses. I have this on a bookmarker on my desk as a constant reminder. It is okay to pray for your difficult situations but remember to be thankful for your blessings. The definition of thankful is being **conscious** of the benefits received. Being grateful is being **appreciative** of the benefits received.

Gratitude brings peace. Count your blessings. Gratitude helps us see that God's hand is over all our circumstances. Taking a posture of gratitude during a challenging time in life can prove to be a powerful choice. It is almost impossible to dwell on hardships and struggles when you are focusing on the good things you are thankful for. These two opposites can't occupy your mind at the same time.

The art of Thanksgiving is consistent, steadfast, genuine year-round thanksgiving in all things, for God is good. I wish you all a very Happy Thanksgiving and a very Merry Christmas. I am thankful for this job and to have met all of you, I am grateful for the relationships formed, and blessed to have you all in my life.

Thankful for the Small Unnoticed Things

Have you ever given thought to where your mind wanders when you are taking a shower or a bath? Most children either hate to take a bath\ shower or they go to the opposite extreme of making it an extended playtime process. Adults are variable with some using it as peaceful leisure private time, some planning their schedule for the day or the next day, others are angry or upset about something and rethinking the situation, and a few may even be thinking of the shower\ bath itself and using hair shampoo, conditioner, and maybe shaving. My recent shower was quite a surprise when I found myself thanking God for the simple fact of having hot water and the ability to take a shower. This startling revelation was brought on when my mind was wandering in different directions about what I did for the day, what I failed to do, and what I had to do the next day. I wanted more hot water, and so I turned the lever. The water got cold, and my mind immediately panicked and went to a broken water heater, a service call, and the cost and time to replace the unit. I quickly rinsed off and turned the lever for one last dash of warm water only to find I had turned the lever in the wrong direction to begin with, and I had all the hot water I wanted. That is when I thanked God for the hot water, for the ability to take a shower, and for my ability to even walk into my shower.

As I thought about this simple act taking for granted hot water, a shower and being able to walk, I realized there are so many small acts of kindness and thoughtfulness from people in our lives that go unnoticed. Take the church for instance and all the behind-the-scenes action that we never notice and take for granted. I will not mention names, least I forget someone, but here are some examples: This summer, we had services at the chapel in the cemetery. We do not use prayer books. Someone took the time to type up new service pamphlets for both morning prayer and the regular service and even printed out "large print" pamphlets. Then we have our senior and junior wardens and our vestry, who freely give of their time every day of the week, including the footwork of selling the rectory, balancing a budget, worrying about repairs, resolving issues, preparing for church functions and events, and attending and participating in our many outreach programs and our affiliate organizations and sister churches.

Extending beyond the wardens and vestry, we have our parishioners who volunteer to host morning prayer, serve at the church service as readers or chalice bearers, take communion to the shut-ins, wash the chalice and linens after the service, cook, bake, make soups, coordinate events, bring food for the events, set up and clean-up after the events, compile and assemble our Topics, update our church directory, assemble and stuff mailings, update the website and Facebook, count and record the offerings, run our Zoom sessions, volunteer for the summer reading program, teach our youth with Sunday school and events including Easter egg hunts and Christmas pageantry, make meals and serve at soup kitchen, coordinate and hang articles for the Clothesline of Love, prepare or update and print church visitor pamphlets including the church history, stained glass window history and the Book of Remembrance, and purchase, prepare, and serve Thanksgiving dinners for our needy.

We have our church staff who do the background leg work including cleaning the church for all that happens in the church. And we have **the Rev. Dr. Kurt Kovalovich** who is a true blessing for all the churches he serves and the boards and committees he sits on. He is available most times, always returning emails and texts, participating in or leading our programs, and giving advice and direction when needed. All of this is done while holding down a full-time job in his medical profession.

We also have our hard-working laborers and board members of the Charles Baber Preservation Trust and the Marion Price Trust. Everyone gives of their time, their skills, and their money to keep things working and maintained, and to take care of the people who come to them whether in need or grief.

Learning Life's Lessons From A Tree

People, in general, love stories with a happy ending. We as Christians celebrate December with a happy and joyful year-end through the birth of Christ. At the Charles Baber Cemetery, the wide variety of trees, plants, and flowers celebrate a happy ending through each month of the year. December in particular, because of the celebration of Christ's birth, is especially meaningful because it offers an environment of quietness and a time for reflection. The hustle and bustle of the Christmas season is left at the gates' entrance, as the trees whisper enticements of peace, harmony, acceptance, and love. There is no judgment. They invite each visitor to come and walk the many paths and feel the closeness and beauty of nature that God gifted to the earth.

The trees' evolution of life as it changes each month depending on the weather and the season, provides us with many of life's lessons. The barren trees in winter have to endure the harsh, cold, windy, icy, and snowy weather, and yet their limbs, trunks, barks, and shapes are laid bare for the world to see. It is at this time, without the outer leaf covering, that we evidence the inner soul and beauty of that particular species. The trees in this season teach us about endurance and perseverance and that while we may be exposed and vulnerable at times, it may be our moment when our inner beauty and soul shine forth.

In the months of January, February, and March, the trees teach us about hope and faith, and a promise of more pleasant things to come. Hope for warm weather and fair skies, and faith that the bad weather months eventually end and bring a more promising spring. Hope, faith, and promise for better things to come, is what all humans need to get us through bad times.

April and May are joyful, exciting, and productive months for trees. They come alive. They are rejuvenated, refreshed, and flowering. It is the same thing for us humans, sometimes all we need is a vacation, or a time away from everyday stress and routine, or recovery from surgery or the loss of a loved one. We need to wake up, shake off the mundane life or sadness and come alive, refreshed, and eager to begin again.

The months of June, July, and August are months of high activity, growth, and expansion months for a tree. This is when they grow their leaves, expand their girth, width, and volume, extend their limbs, and maybe peel some of their bark. And yet, they use their massive structure to shade the weary and hot visitor, the birds, and the ground critters from the sun's relentless rays. This lesson is well learned by people as we energize for a day's work, or major project or event, or simply fortify ourselves for the daily grind and toil. And yet we must find the time to consider others and to use our resources to help others.

September, October, and November are when a tree can be most dazzling with its fall foliage coloring. Sometimes, it uses its assets to be an outright showoff about how beautiful it is. And we as humans are just like trees. There are times when we are at our peak performance. We are in the spotlight. We are at our best. We are exceptional. And yet, for some of us, it's hard to resist being smug and arrogant about it. We know we are good, and we want the world to know it too.

And that brings us to December. It is a time when the tree has run its course for the year, it is shutting down. It has had a wonderful year but now must rest and reflect. All of us must do that as well. We must take time to rest and reflect to enjoy the quietness of the moment and to have a happy ending to our day. Many of us do it in prayer at the end of our day.

We board members and cemetery workers, on behalf of our trees and the lessons they teach us, wish everyone a joyful and peaceful Christmas and a healthy and refreshed New Year!
