Musings from the priest's computer...

September, 2023

Although we are not animists—those who believe that living and inanimate objects have spirits which influence humans—the created order does influence us in many ways. Foggy or misty mornings seem to envelop us, and bring melancholy or introspection, while brilliant sunlight can lift our mood and give energy. Likewise, a beautiful vista gets the heart and mind racing. We are leaving the colors of summer, greens and reds and yellows and purples and blues, for the bronze shades of autumn. The lengthening night times are teasing us as counters to the location of dawn and the associated warmth of sunlight. Our liturgical order is also subtly changing from the Matthean themes of the work of Jesus and his miracles and encompassing more of the coming of the Kingdom of God here and now.

As the autumn days approach quickly, the Church in Schuylkill County is also moving quickly. Numerous events are highlighted on the ministerial and outreach calendars. There will be joint worship, joint exploration of our shared history, teaching and learning opportunities, and of course, liturgical events which call us again and again to pray, and praise, and gather and love one another. Included in these are Baber Day, with tours, music and solemn Evensong, our Annual Outdoor Eucharist and Picnic in September, monthly Saturday evening Vigil Services, the Blessing of the Animals, and of course, fellowship, masking as fundraisers. Instruction for those seeking Confirmation or Reception in the Episcopal Church begins after Baber Day and is also a great opportunity to learn and grow your faith while lifting others with your unique experiences and insights.

Differing smells, changes in vegetation, the starkness of tree bark contrasted with the changing leaves and flowers all are harbingers of the next season. Animals are getting ready as we must also. Ready ourselves for the next church season and readying for differences in the life in our congregations throughout the county may touch us all somehow. As summer slowly—or rather quickly—starts a movement towards autumn, continue to pray for one another in joy and love. Welcome each other as you so ably welcome those unfamiliar to you. And above all, invite others in to watch and pray and participate in the life of the best kept secret in Christianity, the Episcopal Church.

Nature's Majestic Display

Sept.\Oct. 2023

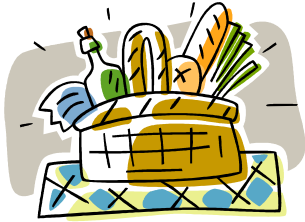
The “majestic” display of Nature can have many facets. “Majestic” can be tall snowed capped mountains, the ocean sweeping in and out on a sandy beach or rugged coast, a rainbow across the sky after a heavy rain, a deep grass and wildflower-filled valley, or a trout-filled lake, or a babbling, wandering brook, or deep sunset tinted canyons, or clusters of stacked rock formations, or giant sequoia and redwood trees, or a lightning storm, or perhaps mounds of sifting and windblown desert sand. For most of us northern folks, autumn is majestic when nature provides miles and miles of trees changing into a panoramic display of red, rose, garnet, mauve, orange, tangerine, lemon, lime, yellow, cream, brown, molasses, and amber colors. Fall is nature's way of sending us a memorable display of its majesty before it closes down for its silent, snowy white sleep. While many people like to go on bus, train, and car rides to the northern states to see nature's fall display, if you live locally, you only have to drive to the Charles Baber Cemetery.

All the sugar, Norway, and sycamore maple trees in the northern states lead the pack in changing color. For the cemetery, in the lower level, north of the Comloquoy mausoleum, our sugar maple changes into bright yellows with large patches of orange. Our Norway maple by the chapel changes into cantaloupe colors, while our sycamore maple west of the chapel has peach coloring. Along the W. Market Street wall, the London planetrees change to pale yellow to offset their multi-colored bark. Across from them the one lonely white ash also changes into a yellowish undertone with wide bands of carrot coloring. The tuliptree on the right inside the main entrance changes into a mustard yellow coloring. Of little notice are the baby coffee tree beside it and the baby horse chestnut to the east of it, both of which change into mellow yellow colors as well. The young homestead hybrid elm to the east of the pond with their skyward reaching branches take on a sandy yellow coloring, not to outshine the bright yellows of the nearby sugar maples. Other trees throughout the property like the elms, little leaf linden, box elder, black locust, black walnut, black cherry, and American beech also prefer subdued yellow colors of straw and wheat. However, the tall gangly female ginkgo to the west of the entrance and the male ginkgo to the east of the entrance become a blaze of bright canary yellow coloring. Following later in the fall display, the European Hornbeam along the Market Street wall changes to butter yellow starting at the tip of the tree and steadily melting downward as the days go by.

These varying shades of yellow serve as deep contrasts to our glorious red maples that are sprinkled throughout the property and also line the road going down the hill from the chapel and the grassy path to the east of the chapel. We have many varieties of red maple, and the depth of their redness varies with the specie. We have candy apple red, scarlet, garnet, burgundy, merlot, carmine, rose, and pinkish yellow. And then we have species like the dawn redwoods, bald cypress, eastern red cedar, and cryptomeria that pick up the earth tones of amber, chocolate, mahogany, walnut, and cinnamon. Our red, white, swamp white, chestnut, and pin oaks are their own enigma. Depending on rain or drought or excessive heat, they can take on yellow shades one year and red shades another year. The pin oak inside the 16th Street entrance and inside the East Market Street wall takes on a salmon coloring. The mighty white oaks to the right of the entrance and the red oaks down the hill from the chapel take on blush rose coloring. And the swamp white oaks to the west of the pond take on an almond coloring with their leaves drying, but clinging fervently to the limbs through the windy wintery months.

In the lower level to the east of the pond, the star-shaped leaves of the sweet gum can have green, yellow, tangerine, and red all on one leaf. The drooping leaves of the sassafras on the middle school hillside can be red or orange or yellow depending on their location and the rain or drought conditions. The leaves of the black gum by the chapel turn orange. We have the staghorn sumac with bright red leaves and dark red popsicle-shaped flowers. And lastly, we have our cabernet-colored leaves of the copper beech by the chapel. Notice the fine silver hairs that edge the serrated leaves. The Japanese larch by the 13th Street entrance gate is the only evergreen that drops its needles in the fall.

Come and walk, or slowly drive through the property or along Market Street to catch the majestic sight that nature provides for its fall entertainment. No matter where you look, nature is breathtaking at this time of year.
